Hello and happy Friday to our wonderful Little Paxton families,

This week Christmas has really started at Little Paxton! For me, the nativity production and the early years tea party really kick start my Christmas! I am sure that if you had the privilege of attending the Year 1 and 2 production of 'Lights Camel Action' you would agree that it was totally FAB-U-LOUS darlings! The children were just amazing and did you all proud. I used to teach in lower school and know how much time and effort goes into putting on the production. There have been so many lovely, positive comments made about the play, thank you for taking the time to share these with us! Thank you also for your generosity, we raised over £140 for the school!

I am so grateful to the team who have pulled the play together so brilliantly! So thank you, thank you to Mrs Rider, Miss Henson, Miss Rose, Mr Inns, Mrs Port, Miss Tingey and Mrs Dulson you are all awesome! Also a big thanks to Mrs Bishop for her help with the costumes and Freddie and Jacob from Year 6 for doing an incredible job with the lights! I can't wait to watch the EYFS children sing this afternoon.

As part of our new curriculum we have moved to DT days so that the children are able to design, make and evaluate a product within a day rather than it taking a whole term. Our Year 6 children kicked off our Food Technology unit this week making Jamaican Beef Patties (linked to their History unit about the Windrush). The corridors were full of amazing smells and the children did a brilliant job of making pastry from scratch. It did look like an episode of 'Ready, Steady, Cook' was taking place in the hall. Mr Saxby and I also spoke to some of our amazing children about their learning in Geography and we were so impressed (if you want to know more, read on as there is a curriculum update from Mr Saxby in the press this week).

Mrs Jeakings organised some brilliant training for the staff team which took place on Tuesday night. It was all about supporting children in school who have been through trauma and helping us to understand what trauma looks and feels like. There were some quite difficult videos to watch through VR headsets but it was an excellent opportunity to look at what we offer children already and what more we could do as a school.

Christmas day was so much fun and the children looked brilliant in their Christmas outfits. A massive thank you to our amazing kitchen team for cooking such a delicious lunch for us all (it's actually making me hungry just thinking about it). Speaking of being amazing ... our Thrive total is now over £2,000 which is incredible! Thank you to each and every one of you!

This week we have also had a full governors meeting (if you are interested in joining the governing body then look out for more information in January when we will be having a parent governor election) and had the Peter Burrow visiting earlier in the week and the GenR8 Team visiting us today for their Christmas assembly (this is always lots of fun).











Message from Mr Saxby



Happy Friday!

We are now almost at the end of the Autumn Term and we have been running our new History and Geography curriculum for just over 3 months. Myself and Miss Owen went to speak to 6 children from each year group about their most recent Geography topic.

We started in Year 1/2 and spoke to the children about their unit that was all about human and physical features in Little Paxton and also about what services are available in the village such as the CO-OP, Chinese Takeaway and Hairdressers. A huge shoutout to Lennie M from Year 2 who told us all about the difference between human and physical features!

Year 3/4 were able to share all they knew about the rainforest. They explained the difference between a temperate climate here in the UK and the tropical climate of the Amazon Rainforest; what the equator is and why most rainforests fall upon it; and they shared a temperature and rainfall graph that they had compared between the UK and Manaus in Brazil.

Year 5/6 have been learning about climate change and how it can affect us in the UK and around the world. The children really embraced the discussions about how we can reduce our carbon footprint and some even said they would try walking to school more or car sharing! They explained to Miss Owen and I about why the "Greenhouse Effect" IS needed (because otherwise the earth would be freezing) but could explain how the human enhanced greenhouse effect is causing lots of issues all over the world including Bangladesh - which was one of our case study countries.

I am so excited for the children to continue to develop their knowledge under the new curriculum and I hope that the knowledge organisers have been helpful. I will be sending out the ones for the Spring 1 History unit the first week back after Christmas. Below are the topics for Spring 1 History if you are interested:

Year 1/2 - Castles and Battles - Who lived in castles and why were they built?

Year 3/4 - Stone Age to Iron Age - How did life change from the Stone Age to the Iron Age?

Year 5/6 - Victorian Britain - How did Victorian Inventions change every day life?

As always, any questions about the curriculum please email the school office.

We also are continuing to populate a googledrive link that we will be able to send out to parents in the Spring Term. This will be packed full of helpful things such as the knowledge organisers, maths 'how-to' videos and recommended reads based on topics.

Well done to another bunch of fantastic fundraisers


We wanted to share a lovely email we received too:-

URGENT VACCINE INFORMATION

We have been asked to pass this message on to all parents by vaccinationuk.co.uk.

Respiratory and flu-like cases are rapidly on the rise. We urge you to ensure your child receives the flu vaccination if they have not already had it. You have a choice between the quick and painless nasal spray or the Injection which is porcine & gelatine free. This not only protects your children against being seriously but also protects vulnerable members of your family and community.

A reminder:-

Please be aware that we still have lots of winter illnesses in school. Please send your children into school with tissues and talk to them about the importance of washing or sanitising their hands. Our policy is that children should remain absent for 48 hours after the last episode of vomiting or diarrhea to avoid any bugs from spreading.

[E Scooters - Information from Cambridgeshire Police](#)

Police are continuing to advise that the use of non authorised e-scooters on public roads are not lawful. The only e-scooters that are permitted to be used are the official council schemes that are unavailable to under 18 year olds.

e-scooters are classified as motor vehicles and need to be fully compliant with those riding having a driving licence and insurance. As you are unable to obtain e-scooter insurance they are not to be used on public roads or areas. Official schemes do have insurance in effect and check driving licences.

We are seeing an increasing number of collisions involving e-scooters and provide this information to safeguard the public. Private e-scooters are generally black with low level lighting with the rider standing still. This narrow silhouette makes you very difficult to be seen.

Children are often at increased risk as they don't have the understanding of roads, lack experience, susceptible to peer pressure, carrying passengers and unnecessary risk taking. If stopped they could face a fine, penalty points and seizure of the e-scooter.

We advise parents and carers to consider the risks involved in e-scooter use and protect their children through prohibiting their use. With Christmas in some minds, they are not suitable presents for use in public spaces.

The risk of fire during charging of private e-scooters can also cause serious human and physical harm.
